- Fatigue
- Developmental disabilities
- Psychological impairment
- Weight loss
- Organ damage
- Coma
- Renal failure

AIR QUALITY IN DETROIT

Detroit is home to some of the most polluted zip codes in Michigan.

Poor air

The health harms of air pollution are preventable speak up now!



HEALTH EFFECTS

Each year, air pollution contributes to almost 2% of cardiovascular disease hospitalizations and 37% of emergency department visits for asthma in Detroit.



Air pollution is deadly, and is responsible for more than 650 deaths a year. This is more than twice the number of residents killed by gun violence annually.

ECONOMIC EFFECTS

Detroit spends \$223 million/year on health impacts associated with air pollution.



Each year, air pollution costs more than 10,000 disability-adjusted life years, which equates to \$6.5 billion in healthcare costs.

WHY DOES IT FLOOD

SO FREQUENTLY IN DETROIT



Household flooding in Detroit is caused by poor sewer backup maintenance & increased water levels in the Great Lakes².





This system was not designed to handle 100-year rainfalls that are happening more frequently due to climate change. When the system gets overwhelmed, infrastructure fails, and flooding occurs.

In public health, we call this a "bottleneck."

HOW DOES FLOODING AFFECT WATER BILLS?

3/4 of the monthly average water bill in Detroit goes to sewer and drainage fees.

Unlike metro Detroiters, Detroit residents pay an extra "drainage charge" on top of water and sewage charges which is supposed to help pay for the city's combined sewer system infrastructure and reduce street/household flooding¹.

The high price Detroiters pay for their water bills is NOT enough to stop flooding. Detroit and its suburbs have experienced historic flooding time and time again in 2021. It's time our elected officials invested in stormwater infrastructure.
